Here are the stories of two South Bank QCA students on their art journey...



Kimberly Anne Smith

Kimberly Anne first did Art in High School, but had to stop because her parents didn't want her to become an artist. She only restarted six years ago; after leaving home. She loves art because: "You can create something that is totally different from anything you've ever seen, but at the same time you can recreate something that you have seen as well." So at first,

she recreated things she'd find online; studying from books and following artists such as Camilla D'Ericco on Youtube and Instagram. After a couple of years, her brother motivated her to do her own work; so she started realising portraits of women of different nationalities, using acrylic on canvas and Prismacolor pencils, to reveal their particular beauty. Willing to acquire new skills, she registered last year for a BA of Fine Arts at QCA in South Bank. Now on her second year, she recognises how her style has also evolved. She exhibited her work for the first time in 2019 and has two more exhibitions scheduled this year. Owning her gallery and showing her work around the world is what she aspires for. If you'd like to be an artist, she says: "Do your research, look on YouTube to find some tips and keep practising. No matter what...Even though you start doubting yourself and feel that you are not good enough, you just have to get through those days, because if you keep practising, one day you will be good enough!"



Toni-Maree Savage

Toni-Maree started Art at primary school. She thought of going to Art College but went to University instead. She never stopped art; doing mainly sculpture at home. She really loves expression in art: "Art allows you to communicate emotions and feelings visually." She's obsessed with Margaret Olly's vision of art: "Art is meant to bring joy and beauty to the viewer." Realising her dream last year, Toni-Maree became a student of a BA of Fine Arts at QCA South Bank and met her co-exhibitor Kimberly Anne. She discovered at College, how predominant intellectualism is in Art; instead of aes-

thetics. Despite this divergence of opinion, she enjoys her studies as they enable her to meet like-minded people and expose herself to various artists: "It is good to discuss even if you don't like some of the styles, you still learn things from work you don't usually find pleasing.", she says. Nowadays she particularly enjoys still life, since she grasped that each component is representative of something. In the future, she'd love to have a gallery to exhibit other artists work as well. Her advice: "Don't worry (if you are young) about how you are going to make money as an artist. Just give it a go and see if you can figure out a way to support yourself with your art." She also advocates to practice as much as you can and try different mediums: "Don't lock yourself off to any type of style until you have done a bit of research on it, then make your decision on what you like or don't like."
